

May they bring you comfort, joy and peace and have a VERY







Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday 9th March, immediately following the Annual Parish Meeting. Councillors Thorne, Edwards, Barter, Smith, Tatner and Rigg were present, together with the Parish Clerk. Apologies had been received from Cllr Williams. Seven members of the public were present. The full minutes of the meeting are on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

It was reported that an appeal for volunteers from Bishopstone to help with the Chalke Valley Fete, which will be held in Broad Chalke on 19th August, had been included in STaB but sadly none had come forward. It was not too late to volunteer – see details elsewhere in this STaB.

Several people had suggested that an event for the whole village should be held to mark the coronation of King Charles III, such as a picnic on the Recreation Field. However, nobody had yet come forward who was prepared to organise such an event, including arrangements for clearing up afterwards, so it was more likely that street parties would be held in different parts of the village instead.

Mike Ash said that he had included a notice in the last edition of STaB on the need for someone else to take over as Clerk to the Parish Council. Nobody from within the village had yet come forward. He proposed to continue advertising in STaB, and it was agreed that Councillors would take the matter up with possible candidates. However, it was increasingly likely that it will be necessary to recruit more widely.

The main discussion in the meeting concerned two planning applications. It was agreed to make no objection to the renovation and conversion of the Granary at Sudbury House, Chapel Lane (Wiltshire Council Ref:_PL/2023/01037).

A lengthy discussion took place of the application for retrospective planning consent for the retention of a static caravan for use as a studio/workshop which had been positioned at Riverside, Flamstone Street (Wiltshire Council Ref: PL/2023/00862). A full report of the discussion is in the minutes of the meeting on the village website. Councillors agreed that this development was inappropriate within Bishopstone's Conservation Area and that it had a detrimental effect on the street scene, contrasting strongly with surrounding buildings built of more traditional materials. Attempts made so far to reduce its impact, by the erection of a screen fence, have not really succeeded. Whilst it was desirable for the caravan to be removed as soon as possible, it was accepted that this development was intended as a temporary measure, while an alternative location for the business is found. The applicants are actively searching for a new home with appropriate accommodation attached. Three letters of objection to the

Council website contained two letters of support and one suggesting a temporary permission.

It was agreed to respond to the consultation from Wiltshire Council setting out the Parish Council's concerns about retention of the caravan but indicating that if Wiltshire Council is minded to grant consent this should be for, at maximum, two years or until the applicants vacate the premises, whichever is the sooner. This should be subject to conditions that the caravan be removed from the site when the consent expires or the applicants leave; and that, in the meantime, additional landscape planting be undertaken, with the caravan and screening fence re-painted to blend in, as far as possible, with surrounding buildings.

Parish Council meetings normally take place on the second Thursday of the month. However, the May meeting this year will take place on **Thursday 4th May 2023** at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

Bishopstone Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Thursday 9th March in the Village Hall. It was attended by Parish Councillors, fourteen other residents and Wiltshire Councillor Nabil Najjar. A full account of the meeting, including all the reports presented, is in the minutes on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

Wiltshire Cllr Najjar said that, in contrast to some other local authorities, Wiltshire Council's finances were in relatively good shape. The budget for 2022/23 of £480 million included a precept rise of only 2.9%. The Chalke Valley had benefitted significantly in the past year from grants from the South West Area Board. He was taking up the issue of speed limits along the valley road with the new Director of Highways.

Cllr Ali Thorne reported on the Parish Council's year. There had been problems of anti-social behaviour in the village with some damage caused which the Parish Council had repaired. The Parish Council has continued to look after the Recreation Field, with additions to the Play Area to cater for the needs of the very youngest villagers, with additional tree planting as part of the Jubilee "Queen's Canopy". He regretted that the Recreation Field is not used more.

George Brutton presented a report from Sarah Seal, who couldn't be present, for the Parochial Church Council. This reflected on the return to more normal church services post Covid. A report during the year on the fabric of the church revealed no major unforeseen problems, though some repair work will be done. The PCC remain very grateful to the Friends of Bishopstone Church and to the teams of volunteers who clean and do the church flowers, which helps keep the church looking so lovely. Restoration work on the organ is planned in memory of Richard Seal, the church organist for so many years. Donations worth over £10,500 have already been received, which is a wonderful tribute. Thanks were also due to the incredibly hard work of the Editorial team on STaB, which continues to be a wonderful asset to the village.

Cllr Barter reported for the Village Hall Management Committee. He said that activities have resumed after Covid but with fewer people attending film nights and community lunches. However the community cafe attendance has increased. The hire of the hall by people within and outside the village was being encouraged, with some success. Thanks are due to a diligent team of trustees who have been joined this year by Kathy Hayles, Sue Grantham and Andy Stocker.

Toby Mills reported on the FTTP Broadband project. He said that huge progress had, at last, been made and he hoped that the network would be completed by the end of March. There have been one or two teething problems but, by and large, installations had been painless and many found that they were paying less for the improved service than they had previously. Everyone in the village, not just those who had been part of the voucher scheme, will now have access to ultrafast broadband. Vouchers were being claimed as installations are completed and we are about halfway to covering the costs of the scheme. As long as everyone who has had the fibre connection claims their voucher all costs will be covered.

Cllr Edwards reported on the worst flooding in the village since 2014. However, thanks to the work of many landowners in keeping streams and ditches clear, and the deployment of some of the Parish Council's stock of sand bags to help one resident, no properties had experienced internal flooding. Regular flooding problems continue to exist in Netton St and Faulston Lane and discussions continue with Wiltshire Council about these. He referred to the problem created by the switch from the copper wire telephone system to that which operates over the fibre network, which means that telephone services are lost in a power cut. A register of those most in need of support in the village was being assembled so that checks could be carried out when an emergency arose.

No issues were raised in the Open Forum part of the meeting.

Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

This is a part-time job with flexible hours which would suit someone who has recently retired, but wants to stay active and contribute to the life of the village, or it can easily be fitted in with other work.

The job involves:

- organising six meetings of the Council a year: agreeing an agenda with the Chairman, drafting any background papers and producing the minutes;
- making sure the Council meets legal requirements as to its governance and financial management (securing funding, dealing with accounts and audit);
- managing projects undertaken by the Council (it spends about £5,000 a year on improvements in the village);
- representing the Council and acting as the main point of contact with Wiltshire Council (responding to consultations, raising issues requiring action, attending some meetings etc);
- helping to resolve problems arising in the village.

Staying in Touch

STaB magazine is a vital source of communication in the village, keeping everyone informed as to what is happening locally. However, the Covid-19 pandemic has highlighted the fact that situations can change very rapidly. To keep up to date with what is going on there are two other important sources of information in Bishopstone - the village website and our own WhatsApp network.

The village website – <u>www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk</u> is updated in real time and carries all the latest news on issues that affect the village.



The Bishopstone Network is a WhatsApp messaging service that has more than proved its worth during the pandemic, and more recently during the storms when residents were able to report fallen trees and blocked roads to the Emergency Planning Officer. Information can be instantly shared to your mobile phone about support services being

provided in the village and on a variety of other matters – everything from the length of electricity black outs to what is available from the White Hart take-away service! UPDATE ON THE RURAL GIGABIT VOUCHER SCHEME AND THE UPGRADE TO ULTRAFAST BROADBAND CONNECTION IN BISHOPSTONE

APRIL 2023

The project is progressing with one or two problems, however we hope that by the end of April/beginning of May the majority of properties who opted to join the scheme will have been connected, with the new infrastructure in place. Do please note that even if you did not sign up to the Gigabit Voucher Scheme you can approach an ISP of your choosing to be connected to the Ultrafast network that has been installed.

We have had some reports of slower than expected speeds that, when monitored, have been entirely due to the lack of an ethernet connection from the hub equipment to the user's computer. On a BT Hub the ethernet cable should go from one of the yellow sockets on the back of the Hub, marked Gig Ethernet to the ethernet connection on the back of the computer. If in doubt please ask and we are happy to help. Ethernet cables are available on line or at Curry's if you do not have one.

We would ask that once you have an activated connection you should receive an email from the Department of Culture Media and Sport (DCMS) Funding Platform with a unique reference which you need to note and then follow the simple instructions to send that reference to Openreach. They can then claim payment from DCMS under the Digital Voucher Scheme. <u>Once you have done that would you please let us know as we are keeping a record of uptake</u>, thereby ensuring that we reach the target value. As of the time of writing that figure is £77,000 which is over 80% of our target figure.

We regret we are not able to help with computer software or mobile phone problems.

Wiltshire Walks with Julia

With spring just around the corner, Wiltshire Walks with Julia is looking forward to enjoying the delights of this new season on their walks in the beautiful Wiltshire and Dorset countryside.

I am Julia Tilbury and for the past 12 years I led walks in the Surrey Hills area and now find myself living in the stunning county of Wiltshire.

Last November I started a local walking group, inviting others to join me to explore our wonderful Wiltshire countryside, especially the Vale of Wardour, Cranborne Chase and the Chalke Valley. I was passionate about forming another friendly and sociable group where walkers could make new acquaintances, share experiences and have a feeling of belonging to something that makes them feel good. I wanted walkers to feel safety in numbers, improve their health and fitness, be led without the worry of getting lost, engage with nature for the benefits of body mind and soul and have the knowledge that all car parks and routes are recced prior to use for suitability and safety.

We meet on various mornings throughout the week, some weekends also; distances range from 4-7 miles, we usually meet at 9.30 am and I aim to be finished by 12 pm. Sometimes we will have a cuppa and refreshments at local coffee shops after our walks.

Through spring and summer, I will introduce some evening walks and we'll have walking days out further afield in the summer, into other counties such as Dorset and Somerset, that will include picnic/pub lunches. I am also planning to start some Wellness walks that will be easy/gentle, 2-4 miles for those needing to build up their fitness/stamina in preparation for joining my longer walks in time.

I am also a fully qualified Nordic walking Instructor and am able to teach the technique if anyone would like to learn; I also intend to have some Nordic walks in the future.

Walk - Broadchalke to Croucheston

Although I know the area quite well having parents that have lived in Donhead St Andrew for 20 years, I love nothing more than finding new footpaths to explore and then sharing the delights with my walkers; we are so lucky to have so many footpaths in this county to use and I am still adding more to my repertoire. Stratford Tony and Bishopstone are areas I am still discovering, but recently we walked from Broad Chalke to Croucheston taking in lovely views from Knighton Hill, there are quite a few variations to this walk from 5.5 to 6.5 miles. If you would like to walk this walk, here are the 'approximate' directions:-

Parking is at All Saints Church car park on The Causeway in Broad Chalke. Postcode SP5 5DW What3words - rips.samplers.inventors

Head back towards the centre of the village and the Chalke Valley Stores, look for the footpath to the right of the building; follow this through to a small lane and turn right. The lane ends and the footpath will go through the back garden to the left of a lovely cottage. Follow this footpath on the edge of fields, parallel with the road on your right, in the distance. There are some lovely views across the fields towards Knighton Hill and back towards Broad Chalke.

The footpath will end on a concrete track that is an access lane for the farm Chalk Pit; turn right and head down the track to the road. Cross straight over onto another lane, take care as traffic can come along here fast at times as well as large farm vehicles; after a very short distance, look for the finger post sign and take the footpath on your left along the side of a field to a stile. Once over the stile, turn right onto a gravel driveway with the impressive Knighton Mill on your left and shortly, the Knighton Mill Pottery on your right - <u>https://www.knightonmillpottery.com/</u>

The gravel drive ends on a lane, and you need to go straight ahead, follow the lane past lovely Knighton Manor on your right and when the lane bears sharp left, there is a field in front of you. The footpath is slightly off to your left, the River Ebble running alongside on your left and the expanse of the field to your right. Follow this field into another and then at the end, you'll enter a small enclosed area of small hedgerows/trees, you'll come out onto a quiet lane with Corn Mill on your right in the village of Croucheston. Follow the lane straight ahead, then left and right past various village properties to a t-junction and turn right. This lane ends once again onto a wide Drove track, follow this past some farm buildings on your left and as the footpath starts to go uphill, turn right onto Bishopstone Hollow Track. This works its way uphill under small trees and either side, hedgerows. There are a few gaps in the hedgerows on the right where you can get glimpses of the Chalke Valley below. Almost near the top, there is a large opening on your right, definitely worth a breather here to take in the glorious views.

The footpath continues for a short way before it opens up in a field; the footpath used to go straight ahead at this point, but it now appears to follow the edge of the field on the left up towards an impressive long copse of beech tress (if I remember rightly!) where it meets a concrete driveway up towards Knighton Hill Farm.

Take time to look around at the views if you are lucky you can sometimes see the spire of Salisbury Cathedral.

Once at the farm, keep the barns on your right and go through a gateway into a field and bear right in front of a smaller barn towards a tree/hedge line. Follow the footpath straight across the field to begin with and then it will bear left and downhill towards Church Bottom. Turn right and towards the road, Knighton Road; go straight ahead on the lane passing Manor Farm on your right. Turn left with the church on your right and go through the churches' lych gate into the church yard and bearing to the left of the building, follow the footpath back to the car park.





Chalke Valley History Festival

The Daily Mail Chalke Valley History Festival returns this year from 26th June to 2nd July. This unique festival looks set to attract huge crowds of all ages.

For the first time this year, the entire programme will be themed, enabling visitors to find the talks and events they are interested in more easily, and to also encourage a little curiosity too. Household names such as **Simon Sebag Montefiore** and **Antonia Fraser** will be taking to the stage in the speaker tents, whilst some of the most talented and vivacious historians, raconteurs and actors will be entertaining the crowds with a blend of inclusive hands-on activities and demonstrations. Just one of the big draws in the programme will be former Prime Minister **John Major** who will be talking about politics, both past and present. The BBC's International Editor, **Jeremy Bowen**, will also be making his festival debut when he discusses the making of the modern Middle East, and *Guardian* columnist **Polly Toynbee** is bound to fuel debate as she examines the true state of class in Britain.

Huge **living history encampments** will be constructed around the festival site, and these will range from the Iron Age through to the Cold War. The Medieval encampment will be the centrepiece of the festival and is not to be missed. There will also be live music every day, special activities for children and families, as well as every-thing you'd expect from an English summer festival set in the glorious rolling chalk landscape of ancient Wessex: delicious locally-sourced food and drink, lots of shopping, more books to buy than you can shake a stick at, camping under the stars, and just the occasional crack of musketry, the thunder of hooves or the boom of cannon fire. The Chalke Valley History Festival is where history comes to life and where memories are made.

The full programme, and more detailed information about what's in store this year, will be unveiled in due course. **Tickets will go on sale to the general public on Tuesday 25th April.**

Over 200 fascinating talks, given by incredible historians and entitled 'Chalke Talk', can now be heard on the <u>Chalke Valley History Festival podcast</u>. These talks have been taken from more than a decade of festival appearances.

In Our Night Sky - The Moon, its Influence on Life

The formation of the Moon has had a profound influence on the formation of an Earth suitable for the development of Life.

The latest mathematical models indicate that less than 100 million years after the Earth was formed it was hit by a Mars sized object twice. Debris from the two impacts coalesced to form the Moon. The first strike was a glancing blow, then around 100,000 years or so later a full impact. One basic fact used was that the compositions of rocks found on the Moon during Apollo missions are the same as on Earth

Whilst initially molten (as was the Earth) tidal effects were stronger, so the rotation of the moon slowed relatively rapidly, consequently to keep the total angular momentum constant the Moon had to move away from its initial distance of 25,000 miles or less. This process has also caused the Moon to show the same face to the Earth in perpetuity. The rate of separation slowed, but even now as the sea tides on Earth slow its rotation, the Moon moves away by 3.8 cm per year. The equivalence in visible sizes of the Sun and Moon is just a coincidence.

The Moon has a relatively thin liquid iron layer around the core and a very weak magnetic field. It was volcanic at an early stage leading to several large "seas" of lava, but has been inactive for millions of years and is covered by meteorite impact craters.

Theia's impact enriched Earth's iron core, which in the outer liquid layer, convection produces a magnetic field, which in turn forms protective shield around the planet. The increased mass/ gravity also helps retain our breathable atmosphere.

It also deflected the Earth's axis of rotation from the ecliptic by 23.5 deg., the limits of the tropics, giving significant distribution of heat and rainfall away from equator towards the poles. The dual body system also helps stabilise Earth orbit and reduce polar drift/ wobble, all leading to a more stable suitable climate for life to begin and continue.

On the Loss of a Dog

Welcome to April's 'Notes from a Nutritionist'

As I write this the clocks are about to change and there are signs everywhere that Spring is coming. But as we know from the unpredictable weather we've had recently, we still need some warming suppers that we can turn to when we've spent the day dodging April showers.

With school holidays looming, this month I've come up with a family-friendly sausage and bean casserole that can easily be adapted to feed more people or to make an extra portion for freezing.

Sausages are a perennial favourite and come in a wide variety of sizes and flavours. I use simple pork sausages for this recipe, but you could use chipolatas, meat-free sausages or flavoured sausages such as pork and apple which would all be delicious. You can then add whatever vegetables you have to hand - spinach, courgettes or even a can of sweetcorn would all work - but I've recommended red peppers and seasonal spring greens.

Red peppers contain vitamin A that supports good eye health. They also have very high levels of vitamin C which increases your absorption of iron from your food and can help prevent anaemia.

Spring greens are in season now and are part of the brassica family. They are looser in shape than a traditional cabbage and taste sweet and fresh when cooked. They contain natural plant chemicals that are anti-inflammatory and can help protect against heart disease and stroke.

Finally I've added a drained can of cannellini beans as they are full of fibre and means I only need to use one cooking pan, but you can easily leave them out and serve the casserole with potatoes or rice instead.

Recipe of the Month - Smoky Sausage and Bean Casserole

By Amber Cotton

Serves 4

1 tbsp olive oil
8 pork sausages (or similar)
1 onion, finely chopped
1 large carrot, finely chopped
1 celery stick, finely chopped
1 large red pepper, diced
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
400g tin chopped tomatoes
400ml chicken stock (made up with ½ stock cube)
1 tsp smoked paprika
1 tsp Dijon mustard
400g tin cannellini, drained and rinsed (optional)
100g spring greens (finely sliced)



METHOD

- 1. Heat the oil in a large, lidded non-stick frying pan or flameproof casserole dish over a medium-high heat. Add the sausages and cook for 5 mins, turning frequently, until browned all over. Remove from the pan and set aside.
- 2. Add the onion, celery, carrot, red pepper and garlic to the pan. Cook over a medium-high heat for 10 mins until softened and lightly golden. Return the sausages to the pan along with the tinned tomatoes, stock, smoked paprika and mustard. Season lightly with salt and pepper and stir. Bring to the boil, then reduce to a simmer for 20 mins until the sauce has thickened slightly. Add more stock if your sauce is getting too thick.
- 3. Stir in the beans and greens, then cover and simmer for a further 5 mins until the greens have softened. Spoon into bowls to serve.

To freeze this dish, allow to cool completely and transfer to an airtight, freezer-safe container. Defrost thoroughly before reheating. To re-heat: loosely cover with foil and bake until piping hot.

Police Bulletin

A new monthly newsletter from Philip Wilkinson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire.



Wiltshire PCC Philip Wilkinson has added his voice to his fellow south west Police and Crime Commissioners to lobby for further action against fly-tipping.

The group has lobbied the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Therese Coffey MP, to propose tougher penalties for fly tippers.

Their recommendations include:

- Increasing the maximum fixed penalty notices for small scale fly-tipping to £1000
- Changing the maximum fine of £50,000 to become a minimum fine to be imposed on repeat, large scale offenders
- A greater use of powers to impound and destroy vehicles involved in fly-tipping
- Introducing a national waste crime offenders list for individuals and companies
- Supporting and funding the creation of a national analysis resource to enable the police to effectively collect and analyse data on fly-tipping in rural areas and to tackle organised criminal gangs profiting from fly-tipping in the countryside

According to the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA), a total of 55,162 fly-tipping incidents were recorded across the South West in 2020/21, up from 50,506 during the previous 12 months. The cost of fly-tipping on private land is around £150 million a year, and the cost to clear fly-tipping for local authorities in England is nearly £50 million.

Mr Wilkinson said: "Fly-tipping has a detrimental effect on the environment it's something we need to crack down on in Wiltshire. It's not only destroying our beautiful countryside, but also costing our already stretched local authorities millions of pounds.

"We believe it's time to put the cost onto the criminals, not the taxpayers. With the current cost of living crisis this change has never been so crucial.

"The government has the goal to eradicate waste crime by 2043. If this target is going to be met, then there needs to be greater coordination across the country and tougher penalties to deter criminals.

"My fellow PCCs and I look forward to hearing back from the secretary of state on this extremely important matter."



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
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
