Hello from the Revd Ruth Howlett Shipley



Happy New Year! No, I haven't skipped a month but we have just started a new church year!

As the weather turns colder and the mornings are frosty our thoughts start to turn towards Christmas. We are already in pantomime season in the valley and singers are gathering to prepare for carol services. But before we leap straight to images of nativity scenes, Santa Claus and Christmas lunch we celebrate Advent; the four Sundays before Christmas Day. Advent is a time of waiting and reflection but it is also at time of renewal of hope and of movement towards a new beginning.

It is easy to feel that we are living in a very dark world at the moment; the days are still getting shorter, news reports continue to be filled with reports of conflict, natural disasters and dire warnings about the impact of global warming. But advent is a time of hope when we look forward to the light of Christ coming into our world, when we will hear the famous verses from Isaiah 'the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shined and we hear about the angels coming to the shepherds and glory shining all around.

Last weekend I was at the Cathedral for the annual service of 'Darkness to Light' which starts with the lighting of a single candle in the darkness before the Cathedral is filled with candlelight. The birth of Jesus, the incarnation of God in our world, started in the most inauspicious way... a tiny baby born to an unmarried woman who had to take lodging in a stable because there was no room at the inn. Hardly the obvious setting for such a significant event but that tiny, helpless baby came to bring light to everyone and as the prologue to John's Gospel reminds us, 'the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it'.

Christmas is a time of celebration and festivities and there are many opportunities to celebrate in the churches of the Chalke Valley this year. I do hope that I will see you at our Carol Services and Christmas Services where we can come together to celebrate the joy and hope of this season.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund application bid has now been submitted. We will have to await their decision in January 2026 to see if the bid is successful.

The Friends of Bishopstone Church Roof Appeal has now reached over £63,000 in the fund-raising account, which started in January 2025. This includes a recent grant of £15,000 from the Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust, and we are so very grateful for this. We are immensely appreciative of all our very generous supporters who have helped us to reach this figure, not only in donations but also in so many practical ways. Thank you very much.

In November there was a full house at Toby Mills' talk on Rocket Science in the Village Hall, and the evening raised over £1,100. Toby took us on a spectacular space journey from the early rockets to the sophisticated models of the present day.

Bishopstone Church Roof Repairs

HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND BID FOR REPAIRS TO THE ROOF OF THE NORTH TRANSEPT OF OUR CHURCH - DECEMBER 2025 UPDATE

Our formal bid to the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF) was submitted to their London and the South office on 22 October 2025. We are requesting a sum of £250,000 to cover some of the cost of repair to the roof of the North Transept of the church.

The reconstruction work, should we be successful with the request for funding, will be carried out by Ellis and Co of Shepton Mallet, who produced a very comprehensive and competitive bid.

Our bid to NLHF is due to be considered in the December batch of applications received and it is expected that we will know the result in very early January.

It is important to understand that a positive result is not a given. Competition for limited funding is fierce. We have monitored awards for our region for the last 6 months. There are usually up to 50 applications per month to the London and the South area. Of these up to 10 are typically from religious groups though these are not exclusively for Church of England premises. The typical success rate varies in both categories between 40 and 50% - so up to 20-25 successful applications, of which 4 or 5 are for religious groups.

Some of you may have seen recent comment in the national press about the view that the hierarchy of the Church of England has a less than philanthropic attitude to maintaining their properties, preferring to leave it to hard-pressed Parochial Church Councils who often find it difficult to raise large sums of money. We are no exception in that regard, despite the very considerable and great efforts of the PCC and the Friends of Bishopstone Church to raise a proportion of the capital needed and their recent successful application to The Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust.

So, what did our NHLF bid consisted of when submitted? The NLHF are very specific in the information required. Firstly, the bid was in the form of responses to certain key questions such as background of who we were, where we are and why we were asking for funding, with detailed drawings of the work required supported by both architectural and engineering reports from approved organisations. That was the simple bit!

The extra essential input can be categorised as:

Audited accounts for both the PCC and the FOBC

Detailed permissions necessary for the work to be carried out – including responses from English Heritage etc.

However about 95% of the non-negotiable required information needed to be developed from scratch by the Bid Team, including the Project Plan with costings, a Project Risk Register, then specific to the PCC itself, a PCC Business Plan, a PCC Risks and Issues Register, a PCC Maintenance and Improvement Plan 2025-30, a PCC Fund Raising Activity Plan, a PCC Maintenance Management Plan, an Environmental Management Plan, a PCC Financial Management Plan, the Request to Tender documents and drawings, the winning tenderer's response, and supporting documentation detailing the selection process methodology and the reasoning for the selection of the winning tenderer.

......And by no means least – a Bat Survey and an Asbestos Survey. I am sure we all love bats, especially when they are in our belfry, but I am willing to bet the little creatures do not realise the amount of paperwork they create and that it is not for free!

In addition, there was the major and key requirement to meet the NLHF's four Key Investment Principles of Saving Heritage, Protecting the Environment, Increasing Inclusion, Access and Participation and finally, Improving our Organisational Stability. Each of the responses to all the requirements or questions were word-capped, resulting in a need for constant redrafting.

The bid-writing team consisting of Toby and Roger was able to complete these requirements.

Was it fun – no, not really but our documentation is now with NLHF and we must be patient.

So, with our very best wishes for the forthcoming Festive Season, Toby and Roger

P.S. James Gabriel of Coombe Bissett has started to produce a drone video of our church – a short extract was shown at Toby's Rocket Science talk, but much more footage is to follow.

Bishopstone Parish Council

The Parish council met at the Village Hall on the evening of the 13 November 2025. Presiding over the meeting was the Chairman Councillor Ali Thorne. Four other councillors were present along with six members of the public. Councillor Nabil Najar, representative of the Chalke Valley and Fovant, was also present.

The Chairman opened the meeting by announcing that two councillors had decided to resign and had passed him their letters of resignation which he had accepted. The council will now be looking to see if there is anyone suitable to replace them. He also welcomed the new Clerk and councillor Michael Pratt to their first meeting. Michael is also the tree warden for the village.

The minutes from the previous meeting were accepted and the Clerk opened the meeting by updating the council on activity in the village. Of note was a discussion about Hotspires use of the Recreational Field for training on Wednesday and Thursday. The Chairman had received three complaints regarding parking in the village and also in the village Hall car park. The discussion was had about a provision of a hard standing / car park in the rec field which will be explored as a future project. In the meantime, we have written to Hotspires asking them to consider more car sharing and being aware of where they park. Also noted was the new website up and running and all councillors had been provided with work emails, all available on the Councillor web page. Councillor Najar gave a short update on Wiltshire Council activity, noting the focus on pothole repair and new machinery to tackle it.

Councillor Edwards gave an update on the Wildflower Meadow but due to the weather this project has been put on hold. He also discussed a meeting on Martyn's law, the Anti-Terrorism act, and how it could affect Village activity.

The focus of the meeting following that was consideration of the budget for 2026/27, to allow the council to set the precept. The Clerk gave an overview of the present state of finances and discussed increased expenditure for the council in the forth coming year.

Overall detail of the budget can be found on the parish council website (Bishopstone-pc.gov.uk) and the budget was agreed unanimously.

Further discussions were then had about planning for future projects such as replacement of the playground and how the council were going to pay for that.

The overall precept was agreed but has increased from last year.

Finally, correspondence was considered from one of the residents about Mac's Meadow. Action has been taken about the state of the path and the steps to the meadow have been reported through MyWilts for repair.

The meeting was closed at 20.54 and the chairman asked for all present to actively seek potential candidates to join the council by co-option. The council also agreed to move their meeting to a Monday to deconflict with Yoga on Thursday.

Attending all the Area Board meetings, sorting out road problems and overseeing all the financial matters to do with the Council, Mike has done all this purely on a voluntary basis.

On behalf of myself and so many past and present councillors I would like to say a huge thank you to Mike for many years of time and commitment he has given to Bishopstone Parish.

Staying in Touch

STaB magazine is a vital source of communication in the village, keeping everyone informed as to what is happening locally. 



STOP PRESS - Bishopstone in print...(Christmas Edition!)

For this seasonal edition of Stop Press we venture slightly outside the parish to record the events in the Fox and Goose, Coombe Bissett, on Boxing Night, Sunday 26th December 1858. The report in the Salisbury and Winchester Journal was of the subsequent court proceedings and, as such, did not have a headline. If there had been one it would probably have read:

"LANDLORD ACCUSED, POLICE CORRUPTION ALLEGED AND ASSULT ON A CONSTABLE"

The landlord of the Fox and Goose, John Patterson, was accused by the police of "keeping a house open for the sale of beer at half past 11 o'clock on a Sunday night". The press report said "the case appeared to excite

Charles Matthews, one of the county police force, stated that on Sunday evening, shortly after 11 o'clock, he went to the Fox and Goose and found the doors closed. He knocked and was admitted, and on entering he found in the house six men and two girls, with a quart cup half full of beer. He asked the landlord if he knew the time, and he said that it was about five minutes past 11 o'clock, adding that it was no difference to witness, as it was a private party. George Brooks, one of the persons present, asked witness to drink, and he did so in order to satisfy himself that there was beer in the cup. Mr. Patterson told him that he had no business in the house, and that he had better be watching for sheep stealers. At half-past 11 o'clock witness, with Constable White, visited the house again, when he found the same parties in the house. On remonstrating with the landlord, he told him that he had no business there, and had better be looking after the sheep-folds. Some of the party present threatened to throw him out of the house. The defendant said that it was a private party, and he could get off by paying.

considerable interest". One of the policemen gave evidence that he found "six men and two girls, with a quart cup half full of beer" at five past 11 o'clock. The landlord said it was a private party and no business of the constables who should. instead, be "better watching for sheep stealers". George Brooks, who was present, invited one constable (Matthews) to have a drink and "he

did so in order to satisfy himself that there was beer in the cup" (!). Some of the party present "threatened to throw the constable out of the house". Indeed, when the police left they were followed by Mr Brooks and others and a melee took place outside the pub!

Mr. Kelsey, for the defence, said that this case was far more serious than at first sight appeared; for, unless he had been greatly misled, there had been the grossest misconduct on the part of the police. For himself, he was always ready to support the police, and experience in these matters had convinced him of the duty of so doing; but he should leave it to the Bench to say whether all the witnesses he should call were perjurers, for if they were not, the policemen were guilty of great misconduct, and were unfit for the office which they held. Mr. Patterson, his client, was a highly respectable man, who had lived for many years in this borough, and who was probably known to some of the Bench. He had kept the house for several years, and it was admitted that there was no cause of complaint against him. In fact, his efforts had been most strenuously directed to conduct his house in a proper manner. He asked White, the Harnham policeman, what time it was, and then put on his clock ten minutes, for the purpose of clearing his house by eleven o'clock. The persons who constituted the party, and who were spoken of as if they were vagabonds, were the church singers of Coombe, and the two "girls" were two children belonging also to the choir, to whom Mr. Patterson gave some cake.

Much conflicting evidence was offered concerning the time of these events – whether it was before or after 11 o'clock, whether the clock registered "Salisbury time" and whether the landlord had set it 10 minutes fast to allow for "drinking up". Also concerning who called who a d.......d fool!

The lawyer for the defence said there had been "the grossest misconduct on the part

of the police". The landlord was a respectable man and those present in the pub who "were spoken of as if they were vagabonds" were the church singers from Coombe Bissett and the two girls were

children belonging to the choir. They had gone to the pub "for the purpose of singing carols, as is customary in most villages at this season of the year". This was a "case got up by the policemen, both of whom....were most decidedly intoxicated". He

In fact, they were all respectable people, and they went to Mr. Patterson's, for the purpose of singing carols, as is customary in most villages at this season of the year, and he gave them two quarts of beer. Mr. Kelsey observed that he should prove that Matthews called Brooks a d—d fool, and that when he first entered the house it was five minutes to eleven o'clock. He should also show that White had said that he never should have been in the house if it had not been for Matthews, of whom the former did not speak in very complimentary terms. Mr. Patterson denied most strongly using the offensive language imputed to him; in fact, he was not in the habit of so doing. He was instructed that nothing was paid for after ten o'clock, and that the beer in the cup was presented by the defendant to the singers, and that it was a case got up by the policemen, both of whom, he should show, were most decidedly intoxicated. After some further observations, Mr. Kelsey concluded by calling upon the Bench to dismiss the case. He then called:—

called another witness, Uriah Cross, who testified that both policemen were drunk (they had apparently come from Bishopstone after, presumably, checking the White Hart!). It was Matthews who called Mr Brooks "a d.....d fool". All the party were sober and had sung at the church that

The Magistrates retired for more than half an hour, and on

taking their seats,

Mr. Jacob said that the Bench felt bound to convict, and it was their opinion that the police had acted perfectly right in going to the house in order to give effect to the law. Considering, however, the good character which the house had hitherto borne, the high character of the defendant—to which he himself could bear testimony—and taking into consideration also the time of year—that it was the Christmas season, when it was usual for choirs to go about singing carols, and that it was not very late when the police first went in, the penalty to the full amount of 5l. would not be enforced, but would be mitigated to ten shillings and the costs.


evening. Another witness observed that " the policemen caused all the row". The lawyer invited the bench to dismiss the case.

Nevertheless, the magistrates "felt bound to convict", but given the good character of the

landlord and **as it was the Christmas season** "when it was usual for choirs to go about singing carols" the penalty should be much reduced. So, if you are caught after hours in the pub this Christmas, just sing a few carols!

Assaulting A Policeman.—George Brooks was charged with assaulting Charles Matthews, one of the county police, on Sunday, Dec. 26, at Coombe Bissett. Mr. Kelsey appeared for the defence. The assault complained of arose out of the former case. On the policemen Matthews and White leaving the Fox and Goose they were followed by several of the party of singers, and among others by the defendant, who challenged Matthews to fight, and held up his fists in his face. In the course of this case Mr. Patterson was called, and he swore most distinctly that he never made use of the language attributed to him by Matthews when giving evidence in the former case. He also stated that he heard Matthews call the defendant a d—d fool. He did not see that the policemen were drunk.—The Bench fined the defendant one pound and the expenses, which he paid.

There was a post-script — the next two cases heard concerned the alleged assault on the policemen. On leaving the pub "they were insulted by persons in the village". George Brooks was fined one pound plus costs and Thomas Davis 40 shillings for striking a policeman.



Miscellaneous facts from St John the Baptist Church, Bishopstone

PULPIT



The oak panelled pulpit was sourced from Seville in Andalucia. Our rector from 1821-1842, Reverend George Augustus Montgomery, travelled to Spain in 1938 with his wife Cecilia, and sourced many items of oak furniture which were no longer in use in churches and convents. Have a look at all the carvings on the pulpit.



The front panel represents Jesus and St Peter in the Garden of Gethsemane. The figures are carved in wood, and appear to be gilded over applied gesso. The background of trees and foliage are covered in tooled gilded leather. Leather tooling involves creating designs by cutting or stamping into the leather using specialised tools.



St Barbara is depicted carrying a palm, which signifies that she was a martyr. She was imprisoned in a tower by her father, and the tower is shown by her left leg. The chain hanging from her waist indicates that she was held prisoner.

She is the patroness of the Royal Artillery.



Above the lower newel post on the stairs we see Christ the Good Shepherd carrying a sheep across his shoulders, and another is standing by his right foot.



Do take time to look at the many carvings around the church!
