ANNUAL PARISH MEETING AND MARCH MEETING OF BISHOPSTONE PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on **Thursday 9th March 2023 starting at 7.00pm in the Village Hall**. The Annual Parish Meeting is an opportunity for anyone living in the village to raise local issues of current interest for discussion. As in previous years the APM will include reports by village organisations on their activities in 2022 and on current projects affecting the village. **The meeting will be followed by the March meeting of the Parish Council**. All are welcome to attend.

CLERK TO BISHOPSTONE PARISH COUNCIL

In May I will have been Clerk to the Parish Council for 12 years. I think that is probably long enough! It is therefore time for a change and the Council Chairman, Ali Thorne, and the other Councillors have agreed that the search should begin for a new Parish Clerk.

Parish Clerk's come in many shapes and forms (no comments please) – some, like me, are unpaid volunteers, but, increasingly, the job of Parish Clerk is a paid, parttime, employment. To be an effective Parish Clerk you need to care about the place and the community you serve. That is why, ideally, the Parish Clerk should live in the village and be a part of the community. However, that too is increasingly rare with professional Clerks holding the job in a portfolio of parishes.

As a first step we would like to find out whether there is anybody in Bishopstone parish interested in taking on this role, whether as a volunteer or as part of paid employment. If there is I would be happy to work in tandem with them for 12 months while they see what is involved.

What does the job entail? A full description is on the village website (<u>www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk</u>) but essentially it involves;

- organising six meetings of the Council a year: agreeing an agenda with the Chairman, drafting any background papers and producing the minutes;
- making sure the Council meets legal requirements as to its governance and financial management (securing funding, dealing with accounts and audit);
- managing projects undertaken by the Council (it spends about £5,000 a year on improvements in the village);
- representing the Council and acting as the main point of contact with Wiltshire Council (responding to consultations, raising issues requiring action, attending some meetings etc);
- helping to resolve problems arising in the village.

How much time does this involve? Some weeks there is nothing to do, others quite a lot! Averages are therefore a bit misleading – but for parishes the size of Bishopstone it is usually represented as about 5 hours a week. As an unpaid volunteer I feel I have more flexibility and control over the time I spend. However, for others payment may be essential. Rates of pay are determined in relation to nationally agreed scales and is likely to be just over £11.00 an hour, but this would be subject to negotiation with the Council.

As I say, I am prepared to provide initial training. There are also training courses for new Parish Clerks.

MIGHT YOU NEED HELP IN AN EMERGENCY?

Can you cope if there is an emergency in the village – such as flooding or a prolonged power cut?

An important aspect of the village Emergency Plan is what it says about the provision of support for those in greatest need. Bishopstone has many elderly residents and others with disabilities or long-term illness. Thankfully most are quite capable of looking after themselves, <u>most</u> of the time. Whether they can cope in any particular emergency situation will depend on their own circumstances and the nature of the emergency.

Bishopstone has a very comprehensive plan setting out arrangements in the village for responding to a wide variety of emergency situations. We received widespread praise for our rapid response to the Covid pandemic, which was facilitated by the procedures set out in our Emergency Plan. A copy of the Bishopstone Emergency Plan is on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk) under the Parish Council tab.

The Plan established a framework of Area Representatives assigned to small sub-areas of the village. These are the people you should contact if you need assistance in an emergency and are unable to call on established care services, relatives, friends or neighbours. However, we also think that it is important for them to know who might possibly need outside assistance in their area if there is an emergency. Local knowledge may be adequate to ensure that no such person is overlooked, but it may save time in an emergency if information on those who might need help was already available. We therefore wish to collect information on those who potentially may need special assistance in an emergency - by fetching essential supplies, collecting prescriptions, providing transportation or undertaking other urgent tasks. Data protection law requires that any such list can only be used for the specific purpose for which it is drawn up and <u>only held with the consent of those included on it</u>.

There may be some who are reluctant to put their names forward. We would urge them to think again. The list will form a confidential annex to the Emergency Plan for use only by those providing assistance. ALL WE ARE SAYING IS: IN THE EVENT OF AN EMERGENCY ARISING, WOULD YOU LIKE US TO CHECK THAT YOU ARE OK?

Staying in Touch

STaB magazine is a vital source of communication in the village, keeping everyone informed as to what is happening locally. However, the Covid-19 pandemic has highlighted the fact that situations can change very rapidly. To keep up to date with what is going on there are two other important sources of information in Bishopstone - the village website and our own WhatsApp network.

The village website – <u>www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk</u> is updated in real time and carries all the latest news on issues that affect the village.



The Bishopstone Network is a WhatsApp messaging service that has more than proved its worth during the pandemic, and more recently during the storms when residents were able to report fallen trees and blocked roads to the Emergency Planning Officer. Information can be instantly shared to your mobile phone about support services being

provided in the village and on a variety of other matters – everything from the length of electricity black outs to what is available from the White Hart take-away service! Update from the DVS and GVS Team

DIGITAL VOICE UPDATE - FEBRUARY 2023

We attended an open meeting at the Guildhall in Salisbury on 8 Feb 23. It was very well attended to the extent that there was a queue to see advisors from BT. Plusnet and EE representatives were also there.

Our key question to the advisor we met was how did BT define "vulnerable persons?" She read out a long list but only when specifically questioned did she include those aged 70 or over. This was despite us having asked another rep, who we spoke to in the reception area, who immediately opened with "over 70 year olds."

We publicise this so that residents can stress the age issue if they want/need a FREE backup battery to cover a mains power cut.

NEW DV PHONE

There is due to be a **new** phone released in Mar/Apr by BT. It is specifically for vulnerable people, that is those with a degree of disability/ill health. It is a larger unit with big buttons - a non DV version shown above already exists. The new DV version includes a battery and SIM card, which means that if there is a power cut it effectively becomes a mobile telephone and will continue to work as long as the battery lasts. (We have no details how long that is.) We are assuming the SIM card will work on all mobile networks, so will work in Bishopstone.

It will be fitted to work in conjunction with a hearing loop. There was something about an alarm capability - but this was a bit vague. We think it was an indication that this might take over from pendant (round the neck) alarms but in retrospect this does not make sense and some further research is needed. If we find out any more details we will let you know.

Burglar Alarms.

It was acknowledged that linked burglar alarms would not work under DV and apparently ADT are charging up to £250 to switch people to a new system. Please contact your alarm company for details/information about your particular system if it is linked.

DV Adaptor.

As mentioned previously in STaB and at the village hall briefing, your existing telephones will work with Digital Voice and there is no need to buy new telephones unless you want to. Adapters, that plug into a mains socket, can also be used to connect existing telephones that cannot be plugged directly into your WiFi router, to the DV system. Please talk to your ISP for details.

Those with phone on an internal copper line can purchase a DV adaptor that plugs into a power socket.

BROADBAND NETWORK PROBLEMS IN BISHOPSTONE - FEBRUARY 2023

As we are sure we do **not** need to tell you, there have been very significant teething problems in Bishopstone during the introduction of the new Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) system.


We highlight some of the reasons that we are aware of:

- First, Salisbury has been a test bed for the technology. It is therefore reasonable to expect that there would be some teething problems.
- Our new fibre network comes from Salisbury by a different route to the old copper network. This new route is from Salisbury, down the route of the A354 Blandford Road, then it comes across country, through Broadchalke to Bishopstone. The length of this new route is in excess of 20 kms.
- When the new link went live there was insufficient power in the laser signal being transmitted down that link from Salisbury to allow it to function properly. This is the reason many subscribers had a green flashing light on their Optical Network Terminal (ONT), the little white box newly installed inside your property. That situation has now been rectified by increasing the power and engineers visiting those affected.

- Coupled with this there were technical issues at the Broadchalke node that had to be resolve before this extra power could be initiated. That has also been done.
- Some residents have had great difficulty persuading their ISP that they are on the new network this was mainly due to the ISPs or Openreach not using the correct spelling to identify some addresses. Again this has hopefully been resolved.
- There is little doubt that some properties were inadequately surveyed by Openreach or their sub-contractors, so that some residents have had their installation delayed whilst network problems were sorted out.
- Lastly, there is no doubt from discussions we have had with the Senior Engineers that Openreach have had resource issues associated with the whole ultrafast broadband project in and around Salisbury. Again, hopefully this is being overcome.

In the meantime please try and be patient as this network is being transferred to 21st century technology and hopefully soon those who opted for FTTP will be enjoying much faster broadband speeds.

Stars Appeal Bookshop and bucket collections at hospital raise nearly £60,000

Nearly £60,000 has been raised for the Stars Appeal, Salisbury District Hospital's Charity, at its Bookshop and through bucket collections at the Hospital. Last year, the Bookshop raised £36,481.30, which brings its all-time total since it first opened in 2003 to £597,258.58. Meanwhile, the Stars Appeal bucket collectors in the Hospital collected £20,752.27 last year from generous supporters.

Dave Cates, of the Stars Appeal, said: "We want to say a big thank you to all of our bookshop and bucket collecting volunteers for their incredible efforts which make such a difference, not just through the funds that they raise, but also the support they give to patients and their families who come to Hospital, often facing difficult times. Thank you to everyone who donates to our bucket collectors and supports our bookshop. The funds raised are a vital step towards the £1million we are aiming to raise this year to fund projects supporting patients and staff here at the Hospital."

Projects the Stars Appeal are looking to fund for this year include a £142,000 echocardiogram machine for the Cardiac Investigation Unit to reduce waiting times for patients awaiting diagnosis, £55,000 for new scalp cooling machines to help reduce hair loss for cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy on the Pembroke Unit, a £20,000 brain function monitor for babies on the Neonatal Unit, and a £15,000 mechanical CPR machine. These are in addition to the ongoing projects the Stars Appeal fund including support for cancer patients, a 24/7 chaplaincy service, a staff counsellor, and free Wi-Fi.

More room for mums at Salisbury Hospital's Neonatal Unit thanks to the Stars Appeal

Every mum with a baby born prematurely or critically ill at Salisbury District Hospital can now stay by their side on the Neonatal Unit thanks to the Stars Appeal. The Stars Appeal, Salisbury District Hospital's Charity, has funded the construction of two additional 'mother and baby rooms' on the Neonatal Unit. There are now six of these rooms along with four larger en suite family rooms where mums and their partners can stay together.

The £25,000 expansion of the Unit's family accommodation also includes additional space for breast feeding clinics and other support. Projects the Stars Appeal are looking to fund for 2023 to enhance the care of babies at the Hospital include a £20,000 cerebral function monitor to monitor babies' brains on the Neonatal Unit. Notes from a Nutritionist

Hello and welcome to March's new column - 'Notes from a Nutritionist'

I'm Amber and as a registered Nutritionist living in the village, I've been asked if I would write a regular piece for our magazine. I plan to continue with the existing 'Recipe of the Month' but I'll also give you a little bit of information as to why the ingredients I choose are also really great for your health.

This month I'm starting with a simple dish of smoked haddock with lentils. Smoked haddock (or any other fish) is a brilliant source of protein. Protein is vital to help you maintain your muscle mass (which is critical to maintaining mobility as you get older), but it's also key to helping you feel fuller for longer – important for both your blood sugar levels and your waistline.

Lentils too contain protein, but they also contain lots of fibre that will help to keep your gut bacteria happy – healthy happy gut bacteria help to support your immune system and can help to protect you from chronic inflammatory diseases such as type 2 diabetes.

Finally spinach and dill are good sources of several essential vitamins and minerals including vitamin C and vitamin A which will both support your immune system, particularly through the colder months.

Recipe of the Month

Smoked Haddock with Lemon & Dill Lentils

Serves 2

Ingredients

2x 100g smoked haddock fillets 100g / 4oz Puy lentils 1 small onion, finely chopped 1 carrot, finely chopped 1 celery stick, finely chopped 300ml / ½ pint vegetable stock 1 rounded tbsp crème fraîche 2 tbsp chopped dill Zest ½ lemon + slices to serve 1tsp butter 100g spinach Green salad to serve



Method

Set oven to 180C

Tip the lentils into a pan with the onion, carrot and celery. Pour in the stock and bring to the boil. Give it a stir, then reduce the heat, cover and simmer for 20—25 mins, until the lentils are tender. Alternatively you could use a 400g pack of ready-to-eat lentils that are readily available in most supermarkets. Place the ready cooked lentils in a small saucepan with a splash of water and heat gently, stirring regularly, until hot.

Mix together the crème fraîche, half the dill and the lemon zest, adding a little seasoning. When the lentils are almost ready, put the fish in an ovenproof dish with a small amount of butter, cook for approximately 15 mins until the fish is flaky.

When the lentils are cooked, stir in the spinach until the leaves are barely wilted, then stir in the crème fraîche mixture. Divide between two warmed plates and top with the haddock. Scatter over the remaining dill and slices of lemon and serve with a green salad.


In Our Night Sky - Neptune

Neptune is the outer of the now called (water) Ice Giants with an even more apt blue than Uranus. Modern observations have shown a small rocky core surrounded by water and ammonia ices with some methane, making up 90-95% of the planet's mass, significantly more than Uranus. The upper third is liquid, but more interestingly the inner material is thought to be superionic, with a temperature at the core of 5,000 deg.C. Water at extreme temperatures and pressures allows H+ ions in effect to move rapidly and generate high conductivity, which with planetary rotation movement (only 16 hrs.) generates a magnetic field, which again is unusual being 60 deg. away from its axis of rotation.

Neptune—the eighth and most distant major planet orbiting our Sun—is dark, cold and whipped by supersonic winds. It was the first planet located through mathematical calculations, rather than by telescope. The orbit of Uranus was known to be slightly odd and in 1845 John Couch Adams wrote to the UK Astronomer Royal proposing a large outer planet, to explain the behaviour of Uranus and predicting its position. Unfortunately it was not taken seriously and when the Frenchman Urbain Le Verrier in 1846 did the same to the German Johann Galle, Galle found it within 1 hr.of looking, only 1 deg.away from predicted. So Urbain was credited for the discovery.

It has 13 moons, but the largest Triton with a diameter of 2,700 km is the only one in the Solar System which has a retrograde orbit. Triton with a similar composition to Pluto, but larger, is thought to have been captured long ago from the rocky Kuiper belt, a region 30 - 50 AU from the Sun.







Police Bulletin

A new monthly newsletter from Philip Wilkinson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire.



My annual budget proposed a raise the amount of money you pay for the policing part of your council tax, known as the precept, by 6.2%.

For an average Band D household, that equates to £15 a year or £1.25 a month.

It's been a difficult decision to make and that's why it was important we consulted you.

Over 2,700 people responded to the survey. We also took it out across Swindon and Wiltshire to gather your feedback. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank you if you took the time to complete it.

54% of people who responded said they would be prepared to support a maximum rise but it's important to make clear why I asked you to support that option.

Without putting up the precept, Wiltshire Police would need to save over £4m in the next year. Even by increasing the precept, savings will be key but I'm confident this will happen at the same time as delivering a better service.

We will put 32 extra police officers on the streets of Wiltshire, in addition to the new Uplift officers. We should have 1,189 police officers by the end of March this year – the highest number for quite some time.

I am constantly speaking to our local MPs and government ministers about the funding formula. We need a fairer system which provides our police force with the investment equal to forces similar to ours.

By raising the precept, we can show we are playing our part in funding our police force and this puts us in a stronger position.

With more officers on our streets and a better use of our existing funds, I hope you will see an improvement in the service you receive and see value for money in the measures I've taken to make Wiltshire a safer place to live and work.




