Hello from the Revd Jenny Taylor

Advent is upon us! All those calendars will be awaiting the doors to be opened and eager hands will, if they are very lucky, be reaching in and taking the chocolate surprises behind those doors! Others will gaze at robins and angels, snowmen and trees, mangers and wise men, presents and snowy scenes, as the doors open and each one brings the big day of Christmas a little nearer.

Advent is surely the strangest of seasons – we have four weeks of waiting, anticipating Christmas Day and all it means to each one of us and yet while we wait we are SO busy! Cakes, presents, cards (I haven't even bought those yet!), invitations, parties, cooking, planning etc., etc.!! But before anyone drops into a dead faint from all the pressure just sit awhile and remember what Advent is all about – preparing for the coming of Jesus Christ.

The Parish Council met on Thursday 14^{th} November. Eight villagers attended. The full minutes of the meeting are available on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk). The main issues considered were:

- the future of the White Hart pub. It was agreed that whilst there is no imminent threat, it would be prudent to make an application to Wiltshire Council for the pub to be included on the list of "assets of community value" under the Localism Act. This would mean that should the owners wish to dispose of the building for a use other than as a pub the community in Bishopstone would have 6 months to mount a bid to buy it.
- the "garden extensions" in The Styles. Wiltshire Council has agreed in principle to grant a long lease of this land to the Parish Council so that it can be sub-let as garden plots to villagers (see notice elsewhere in this STaB).
- the Bishopstone Housing Needs Survey. The questionnaire forms have now been distributed to every household in the village. The closing date for their return to Wiltshire Council is 22 November. It was expected that a report on the outcome will be produced in January 2014.
- car parking in Whitlock Rise. Residents will again be reminded not to park in the turning circle at the end of Whitlock Rise this obstructs emergency, delivery and waste collection vehicles. Wiltshire Council had undertaken to surface the lower part of the Whitlock Rise car park and they are being chased for a date for the commencement of these works.
- village emergency plan. It was agreed to now produce an emergency plan to cover flooding, snow and ice, storm damage and major interruptions to power supplies. Cllr Barter had volunteered to store sand and sandbags at the Fishing Lodge in Bridge Road.
- speeding in the village. Comments had been submitted to the review of speed limits along the C12 (High Road) seeking an extension of the 30mph limit to west of the White Hart and of the 40mph limit to the village boundary in Broad Chalke Road. An article had been included in STaB asking villagers to report any road traffic incidents along the C12 to the Clerk. Wiltshire Council had turned down the request for a metro count in Harvest Lane, but the Parish Council will continue to press for action to reduce the speed of vehicles in the lane. It was agreed to look again at setting up a Community Speed Watch in the village.
- highways. Wiltshire Cllr Jose Green reported that the contract arrangements with Balfour Beatty are to be the subject of review and an additional £21m had been allocated for road works in Wiltshire (mainly for resurfacing). Wiltshire Council has been contacted about the damage being caused to the highway and verge at the corner of Faulston Lane by the tankers accessing the sewage treatment works and by farm machinery accessing Croucheston Farm.

- recreation field. The new fencing had been installed near the children's play area. Further consideration will be given to what additional play equipment might be installed. It was agreed that more should be provided for both younger children and for 12/16 year olds.
- dogs. Dog fouling is still a problem and villagers were asked, yet again, to clear up after their pets. There is also a problem of dogs off the lead causing a nuisance to walkers, joggers etc. Pet owners are reminded that dogs need to be kept under control, ideally on leads, at all times in public places.
- council tax. It was agreed that the aim, in setting the budget for 2014/15 (to be discussed at the meeting in January), should be to maintain the level of council tax, resulting from the Bishopstone Parish precept, at the same level as in 2013/14.
- planning. The water meadows project at Croucheston Farm was refused planning permission by Wiltshire's Southern Area Planning Committee in October.

When Did the Christmas Tree Become a Christmas Tree

Today we chop down or buy a tree, carry it home, set it up in a stand, decorate it and place our presents underneath it. It wouldn't seem like Christmas without a tree. How did trees become so important in our celebrations of Christmas?

Trees were originally given as New Year's gifts. And, like other New Year's gifts, trees had symbolic significance. Originally, hawthorn, blackthorn and other trees with bright, small blossoms were kept indoors and their blossoms forced, in hopes that they would appear by the New Year. If they did, it was regarded as a good omen for the crops in the coming year. But forcing blossoms was a chancy business, and rather than tempt fate, many turned to evergreen trees, especially those that bore fruit at the New Year.

The evergreen was a great mystery. Why should it remain green and, as in the case of the holly, even bear fruit, in a season when all other types of trees seemed to die? People thought evergreens had magical powers and would ward off evil spirits.

The oak was sacred to the Celtic Druids. At the winter solstice, they decorated oaks with candles and apples painted gold. In one legend, on any eighth-century Christmas Eve/solstice night, St Boniface chopped down a huge oak that had been used for human sacrifice and, pointing to a young fir that had survived the crash of the oak, told the assembled barbarians that this "young child in the forest" should be their holy tree.

Trees, like oaks which outlive man by hundreds of years, or evergreens which never seem to wither, were believed to contain a mysterious life force. They became central features of the rites celebrated on the darkest day of winter, when the life force seemed most vulnerable.

A tree designated as a 'Christmas' tree made its appearance in the late 16th century. It was merely the latest in a long line of mystical or sacred trees that held special significance in popular folklore.

In the earliest description of a 'Christmas' tree, that heritage is clear. In a fragment from a travel diary dated 1605, an unidentified visitor to Strasbourg, Germany, describes tree decorations that included apples (from the Tree of Life?), paper roses (from solstice celebrations?), sweets, wafer-like biscuits (to wish for good times in the coming year?) and golden spangles (to wish for riches).

When Queen Victoria married Germany's Prince Albert, the Christmas tree became quite central to the holiday in the British Isles. It was a time of Victorian commercialism, and of a growing middle class eager for ways to display their new wealth. The tree provided an opportunity to sell more goods to the public and was vigorously promoted.

British trees were only two feet high and sat on tabletops. Tall trees were too precious to be cut down as adornments. Christmas trees had not been officially sanctioned by the church and many regarded them as frivolous.

I expect many people who attend church at Christmas do not realise that the pretty decorated tree has its 'roots' in pagan mythology.

If our plan is to accommodate both standpoints it is important that it reflects the view of everyone in the village and therefore your personal input will have a real influence on the outcome.

We can only reflect what the community wishes to see in the future.

Your postcode is very helpful to us, your name adds weight to our analysis and we group the responses by age group - [0-15] [16-25] [26-40] [41-65] [65+] - but your reply is the most important.

Public Rights of Way

A public right of way is a highway over which the public have a right of access along a linear route.

Types of Way

The nature of the right determines the type of way, which can be either of the following.

Public Footpath

The right of way is on foot only, and way marked with yellow arrows.

Public Bridleway

The right of way is on foot, on horseback or on a bicycle; and way marked with blue arrows.

Byway Open to All Traffic (BOAT)

The right of way is for vehicles and all other kinds of user, and way marked with red arrows.

Restricted Byway

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 will replace existing 'road used as public paths' (RUPPs) with restricted byways. The public will have a right of way on foot, on horseback, on a bicycle and be able to use a horse drawn carriage.

The Law States

Public footpaths and bridleways are **owned** by the landowner, who has the right to do what he likes with them as long as he doesn't obstruct them.

If he does 'need' to obstruct them there are legal procedures for temporary closure and/or diversion.

Pushing a cycle on a footpath was a grey area in law but has now been resolved - anyone pushing a bicycle is a "foot-passenger" (Crank v Brooks [1980] RTR 441) and is not "riding" it.

Who Gives Way to Whom

Cyclists give way to Walkers and Riders

Riders give way to Walkers

Riders

Riders should not pass walkers at anything other than a walk and should only trot or canter on a bridleway when they can see well ahead.

HIGH DEFINITION TV IN THE VILLAGE HALL

MORE MEMORIES OF BISHOPSTONE

(continued)

Then there was the village hall. It was well used and had two fireplaces, one at the right hand side, the other at the back. The hall caretaker looked after them. There was always something going on – jumble sales were very popular, school children's' plays which people loved. At concerts one lady always performed with her birdcage singing 'I'm only a Bird in a Gilded Cage'. Young lads sang 'Old Macdonald'. We'd heard most of it before, but we didn't mind. The postmaster got people out from town to entertain us. They were very good. One lady had a beautiful voice but, oh dear, when she raised her arms there was lots of tittering from the back. We had a band with a big drum, and another man had a deep voice and always sang 'Ole Man River'. He did have a violin once, but what a scratchy do. Also there were children's parties, which they loved of course.



Mrs Seager, Headmistress

The school in the 1950s had two classrooms and two teachers. How good they were with the children. The headmistress was a motherly lady, but firm with the children in a kind way. The pantomimes she put on were wonderful. How she got those children to be so word perfect, I'll never know and they loved it. Once a month we used to go to her house to pay the Doctor's League – 1 penny (now 0.5p) a week, and 1 penny for maternity expenses. It doesn't sound much now but it was a big help when needed. No National Health in those days, or Social Security. It was hard, we were all in the same boat and managed somehow. At the end of school the children used to run down to the gate and wait for the teachers to see them across the road. No accidents. Then into the little shop to see if Mum had a penny for a sweetie or two. Sometimes they had races in the playing field. They all got a packet of sweets, but extras for the winners. In the summer there was an outing to the seaside. Wasn't it lovely on the sands playing with one's friends. Television stopped that, TV or outing, sadly TV won.

The White Hart Inn, the Three Horseshoes and the school were the hub of the village. At the pub on the menu I think it was always 'I'll have one at the bottom and then see you up top!' There was plenty of chatter and gossip, especially at voting time when there was a good Liberal movement in the Valley. Of course the most important of all was football. Wherever you went 'What did you think of the game today?' It was certainly a holy ritual. But the men loved their pint, chatting to their friends. The landlord used to collect all the dogs from their houses, put them in his van and go off for a day's rabbiting, and bring them home at tea time. None got lost. The farmers did rook shooting every May. Two or three tractors and trailers, loaded with men, dogs and guns, would go off in the evening and then finish at the pub, and a good evening was had by all. There was many a Rook and Pigeon Pie the following days.

There's so much more to the village. I think back to the time when I got off the bus on that beautiful crisp, sunny morning. Would I change it and go back? Not in a million years. The thing I miss most now – on Saturday nights the men leaving the pub at 10 o'clock. I used to listen from my landing window: 'Goodnight, see you tomorrow, so and so.' I'd see them lighting their cigarettes, bursts of laughter, the yap, yap, yap of a disturbed terrier, the flip flop of feet running down the road, someone whistling and a last 'Goodnight'. I've seen it come and go. I'm fortunately here. But this is just a memory.

The Chris Brown Day Centre is a long established and active group, originally set up by Bobby Brown's late husband Dr Chris Brown, to provide a weekly venue for the more elderly in the community who were seeking company, interest and a regular meeting point outside their own homes. Dr Brown felt very strongly that there are tremendous benefits to be gained from sharing each other's company within the community; and this has been proven over the last thirty years.

The Day Centre meets every Thursday in the Bowerchalke Village Hall. It is run by an experienced Organiser with the help of a number of excellent local volunteers. A team of volunteer drivers is also available to bring in guests who do not have their own transport.

The Day Centre meets at 10.00am and entertainment is organised each day. This may be outside speakers, talking on a range of interesting topics, as well as in house events including light physical exercise, art, craft and musical days too.
