

BORDER DISPUTE ESCALATES



Readers will remember comment in STaB a couple of months ago about a border dispute with Wilton. Ace Reporter Ephraim Sandcastle has investigated this dreadful affair and can report on the latest developments - many of which will make very difficult reading for the worthy citizens of Bishopstone.

The undisputed facts are that Wilton Council has made an unprecedented and unprovoked land grab by siting a border sign (see picture) well inside the parish border of Bishopstone. While initially the incursion was treated as a genuine mistake, the matter was raised with Wilton Council by the Parish Council in a polite letter. The hostile and derogatory response about there being "Wooly minds in wooly hats" resulted in the matter being escalated to Wiltshire Council's member for disputes - Mr Nathaniel Jobsworth, who was unfortunately on a climbing holiday in Norfolk at the time, so no action was taken and the matter remains unresolved.

As a result of this second hostile act, steps were taken to denote a Parish perimeter - by painting the trees with luminous paint so that potential combatants are aware of Bishopstone's borders, especially at night. This was not a great success as volunteer Russell Sprout backed into a tree and now has luminous paint on his new anorak.

Regrettably, further border incursions have occurred with patrols from Wilton disguised as dogwalkers attempting to seek out the true state of Bishopstone's defences. There have also been reports of suspicious infiltration of the village boundaries by shifty looking characters claiming they were selling double-glazing or purporting to read water meters.

At a recent Extraordinary Meeting of the Parish Council shouts of "Diabolical" and "What are you going to do about it" resulted in a unanimous decision for Bishopstone to declare UDI from Wiltshire and for the village to consider raising it's own Defence Force; though there was a proviso that some form of peace talks should be attempted first.

After the heady wine of the declaration Ephraim can report that there are considerable problems as none of the Parish Council seem to have conducted bilateral arms negotiations before. The only one with any experience, Miss Iona Frisbee, admitted that it was limited to adjudicating at a Beetle Drive in the Village Hall.

However the Call to Arms has resulted in a drill parade on the village hall car park - (very poorly attended) and a camouflage lecture in The White Hart (a capacity audience). Dust and cobwebs have been blown off the Village Defence Plan (1940 version). To further bolster the village defences there will be a "Buy a Challenger Tank Stall" at the Summer Bish Bash and the Archery Stall will have a very special meaning this year as the search is on for Bowmen. A Call-to-Arms poster will soon be displayed. Further reporting to follow.

VILLAGE MEMORIES





MIKE BUNDY

1 **EARLIEST MEMORIES**

Air raid shelter by the fence at the Manor Farm Cottages. The fire engines in 1944 going through the village to West End, Croucheston where the mill burnt down. My uncle Len Kent owned the mill. I remember a bomb fell over the hill behind Croucheston Farm. The searchlight station over the Drove to shoot down enemy planes. Also the British planes dropping down long lengths of silver paper. (It was known as chaff and used to distract radar-guided missiles from their targets.)

2 **HOW LONG HAVE YOU LIVED IN BISHOPSTONE?** From birth - 81 years.

3 HAVE YOU ALWAYS LIVED IN THE SAME HOUSE HERE?

Lived with my parents at 4 Cottages (now known as Manor Farm Cottages). At the end of 1944 we moved to Croucheston (now known as The Cross). Married on 9th Sep 1961, then moved to a couple of rooms at Riverside, The Alley, with Ron Stratton. There was no running water and I remember we had to collect spring water in plastic containers. In May 1965 we moved to Whitlock Rise where we now live. People then married more locally and tended to stay in the Chalke Valley.

4 SCHOOL

Started school at Bishopstone, then I moved to Broad Chalke until the leaving age of 14 years. A short time was spent at Ebbesbourne Wake school because my mother moved there while my father was in the war.

5 WORK

Left school at 14 years and became an apprentice for 5 years at Anna Valley Motors off Castle Street, Salisbury in 1952. When I was 21 I had to do my National Service in the REME (Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers). I returned to the firm and finished there running the Commercial Workshop. When I was made redundant, after Lex Group bought the company in 1998, I then did part time work at Salisbury Joinery in Salisbury. Worked for Freddie Plaskett doing his garden.

6 HOW DID YOU MEET YOUR WIFE?

In 1957 I met Sheila coming back from the pictures on a Sunday evening on the last bus home (which was at 10.30!) The bus was always full, with people standing. I got into conversation with Sheila and started chatting her up! If the films weren't good, the men would go into the nearby pub instead, but women weren't allowed in. 6 months after meeting Sheila I had to do my National Service for 2 years which involved being posted to Blandford Camp, Gosport, and Detmold in Germany. I wrote to her every day. We then got married in her local church at Bowerchalke in 1961. We renewed our marriage vows for our Golden Wedding Anniversary at a service in the same church.

7 WHAT ARE YOUR HOBBIES OR PASTIMES?

DIY and gardening. Used to own 6 old stationary engines which were used to run farming equipment and I showed them at rallies. Like watching grass track racing (used to own a motorbike). Played football and cricket for Bishopstone. Skiffle group in the Army.

8 WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE HOLIDAY?

United States – first with the Wilton & District Band in 1985, then in 1992 in The Rockies when visiting Sheila's sister. Only disadvantage with The States is they serve too large food helpings.

9 YOUR FAVOURITE BOOK

Shoot Like a Gentleman by Freddie Plaskett (who lives in Flamstone Street). Like reading motor magazines.

10 YOUR FAVOURITE MUSIC

Country and Western. Brass band, having the connection of my children playing in the Wilton & District Brass Band.

11 IMPORTANT THINGS YOU'VE LEARNED IN LIFE

Respect other people. Treat life as it comes.

I consider myself very lucky to have Sheila as my wife for 57 years this year. According to Sheila, Mike is a great Dad, Granddad and Great Granddad to 3 children, 5 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild.

NEW ROAD SIGN IN BISHOPSTONE

I refer to the letter from Rob Pendlenton regarding the new "Narrow Road" signs for Faulston and Mill Lanes. These signs were erected by Wiltshire Council at the request of the Parish Council, which will be paying half the cost. This request was submitted following representations to the Parish Council from those living in Faulston/Mill Lanes and following various incidents where vehicles got stuck in Mill Lane and had difficulty in backing up. Regard was also had to the increase in traffic likely following the redevelopment of Faulston Barns.

The project was the subject of discussion in meetings of the Parish Council. This is recorded in the minutes of the meetings in September and November 2016 and again in September and November 2017. Those minutes are made publicly available on the village website so that everyone in the village is aware of proposed projects such as this. The project was also mentioned in the Parish Council reports published in STaB, most recently in February 2018. If there were concerns about this project they should have been raised at a much earlier stage.

The size and design of the signs are dictated by the Government's "Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2016" and the precise locations were decided by Wiltshire Council's highways engineers.

Kindness Rocks!







If you've been walking around the village, or maybe Salisbury, the eagle-eyed amongst you may have spotted some brightly coloured painted rocks. This is part of a national craze called Kindness Rocks in which rocks are decorated and hidden so as to provide the finder with a little happiness. They should then be rehidden, either in the same place or somewhere else, so that they can be found once again. They're great fun to decorate and lovely to find, and those who have hidden them love to see that 'their' rocks have been discovered. There's a local group on Facebook called 'Kindness Rocks Salisbury UK' where you can post pictures of rocks you have found. There are several hidden around Bishopstone as I know of 3 of 4 local families who have been painting and hiding them! If you'd like to have a go yourself it's recommended that you use acrylic paint and then seal the rocks with varnish, although we have also decorated a few using 'Sharpie' permanent pens. Be sure to write on the back too - 'f: Kindness Rocks Salisbury UK Please rehide'. It is illegal to remove rocks from the beach, but if you don't have any suitable ones in your garden they can be bought cheaply from places like B&Q or InExcess. Enjoy decorating them – and happy hunting!

They knew what they were doing, and we must try to keep their system going if we are to reduce flooding in the valley!

Councillor JOSE GREEN'S ANNUAL REPORT.

As I write this there is a heavy blanket of snow covering the landscape, this triggers thoughts of those most vulnerable amongst us and whom in some cases we need to look out to. With exceptionally cold temperatures we all need to be aware of what we should or shouldn't do. Wiltshire Council, as all Local Authorities have, has a role to play in emphasising precautions and preventative tips for most situations that we residents face. A recent study showed that 200,000 UK pensioners had not had a conversation with a friend or relative in more than a month and right now more than 9 million people in the UK say they regularly feel lonely; the impact on this is one of the biggest demands and costs to the NHS. It has been said that loneliness can be as bad for your health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. We must do all we can to help combat this issue and the most efficient way is to support the many groups, Health and Wellbeing initiatives, clubs, village halls and organisations we can. Through the SWW Area Board, and it has been my role to be Chair this last year, we consider the funding and support of many communities that request help to enable them to remain sustainable. It might be worth noting that Wiltshire has 253 Town and Parish Councils, the 2nd highest number in the Country all of which have their own way of working and special characteristics. There are 3 AONB's, 240 Conservation Areas and over 16,000 Listed Buildings, a good majority of those being in the South. Wiltshire Planning Authority is the 3rd largest in the UK by applications processed. This takes up a great deal of my time and I realise I cannot please every one on this particularly emotive issue.

Wiltshire has the 3rd highest number of people aged 65 years and over in the Country, (100k of our 488k population) this is likely to rise by around 25% in the next 5 years, therefore the demand is high and is increasing. Transforming what WC do to meet the unprecedented growth in Children's and Adult Social Care services is of vital importance, hence the ring fenced Social Care Levy of 3% for the 2nd year following to address this demand. Already greater integration between Health and Social Care Services is well underway, bringing early help, Safeguarding and Assessment together to reduce duplication, excess time and the frustration for the customer or patient. This will result in a more efficient and joined up service that delivers with a clearer pathway forward. The Help to Live at Home scheme has enabled around 6:500 people to stay independent.

Public Health is a department that deals with many diverse issues, too many to mention at this time but it can be anything from noise, dust and smoke to health matters that need to be highlighted to enable us all, hopefully, to help ourselves. The Dementia Awareness programme is progressing well with more villages and Towns joined up to the Safe Places initiative. Salisbury Cathedral has become a Safe Place with church services directly involving carers and their loved ones who are living with various forms of Dementia. At this moment in time WC is proactively highlighting the cervical cancer screening programme. Nationally, there is a 20 year low on take up by women after receiving an invitation to attend a clinic. WC works closely with the NHS, GP's and Wiltshire CCG's and this is just one example.

Another health concern is that in Wiltshire more than 60% of our adult population are overweight or obese. 20% of children starting school are also considered overweight, as you know this could lead to serious problems later in life. WC promotes Health and Wellbeing for residents and I'm pleased to say the take up of the exercise and fitness classes at the Nadder Centre in Tisbury is increasing well. £41million has been spent on new facilities across the County.

Can I once again compliment the 6,000 volunteers helping to deliver Council services across Wiltshire, including locally based flood wardens, people who help clear and maintain our ROW's, sports coaches, the 868 people who support the library service and the community Litter Picks which helps to reduce the £2:5 MILLION WC spends each year on picking up the rubbish others so selfishly dispose of. Prosecutions are now regularly taking place. Single use plastic is a thing of the past in all Council buildings and constant publicity is given about cups, drinking straws, teabags, microbeads, wipes disposal, plastics and packaging. I shall be updating you on the future waste service as it comes in later in the year.

At a risk of prolonging my report further can I finally say that I'm acutely aware of the many Highways issues. £21 million has been budgeting again this year. Amongst other things this maintains the 15% of the 4:500 Kms of roadways across the County to continue the resurfacing programme. The My Wiltshire App is still proving to be the most efficient way to report works required. I'm pleased the 20mph schemes that have been requested by villages have been supported as also the Speed Indication Cameras by an Area Board Grant that Bishopstone, together with Broad Chalke and Bowerchalke, were the first to take it up. I'm also very impressed with the Community Speed Watch Team of volunteers that have maintained their vigilance on those vehicles tearing along the C12 and beyond.

My sincerest thanks to the PC and particularly each Councillor who is very supportive of me. Please be assured I listen to each and every one of those who contact me and I shall endeavour to do all I can to ensure I am a voice for you all.
